
<u>Week 3 – List sentences</u>

Expanded Noun Phrase

An expanded noun phrase is a phrase made up of a noun and at least one adjective. If you list more than one adjectice to describe the noun, you should add a comma to separate them.



In Year 3, we use 3 adjectives to describe a noun and this forms a list sentence.

Here are some examples:

Adjective, adjective, adjective noun.

The green, furry, ferocious dragon soared through the sky.

All of a sudden, the noise was deafening as the strong, powerful, foamy wave came crashing down.

Leather Shoe Charlie was a generous, kind, compassionate boy.

Key points:

- Remember to include a comma between the adjectives.
- After the last adjective, just before the noun you do not need to add any punctuation.
- In between the last two adjectives, you only need to add a comma. A lot of people use the co-ordinating conjunction 'and' here instead (Charlie was a generous, kind and compassionate boy) but stick to the comma instead so that it remains a list (Charlie was a generous, kind, compassionate boy).
- Be creative with your adjective. Reflect on your words chosen have you chosen the best suited adjective?
- You may want to use a thesaurus if you have one at home. If not try this website, <u>https://www.rhymezone.com/</u>. On the website, click 'synonyms' on the drop down list to find other words that are similar in meaning.
