Hi everyone,


What lovely weather we had over the Easter weekend; we hope you managed to safely spend some time outside enjoying it.

Weekly Maths Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Watch a Numberblocks clip each day at: <u>BBC</u> or <u>CBeebies</u>. Use this guide <u>here</u> to give ideas on what to do whilst watching an episode.
- Working on Numbots your child will have an individual login to access this.
 As a class we have earned a total of 22,878 coins. Keep up the hard work mathematicians, you're doing fantastically!
- Play the Numberblocks add and subtract quiz.
- Practise counting up to 20. This can be done through playing hide and seek, singing number songs, chanting, board games etc.
- Write out the digits 0 9.
- Practise recognising amounts up to <u>five</u> or up to <u>ten</u> by playing these games. This can be done by reading a dice when playing board games, playing with cards, identifying how many food items on the plate etc.
- Listen to a number song from the <u>CBeebies</u> website. After listening to them, watch again and sing along if you can. Talk about the maths you can see in the video clip.

Weekly Reading Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Read a variety of books at home.
 Favourites can be repeated. Hearing the patterns of language in a story will support your child's language development.
- Visit Oxford Owl for free eBooks that link to your child's reading age. You can create a <u>free account</u>. You could read each page for your child, whilst pointing to the words. This will support your child to know that text is read from left to right. You could then encourage them to echo read what you said.
- With your child, look in magazines, newspapers and books for phonemes they are currently learning (s a t p i n m d g o c k). They could use a highlighter to highlight in magazines and newspapers
- Make an Alphabet Museum Create a
 DIY showcase with some cardboard
 boxes/paper and write a big letter in the
 middle of each of them. Have you
 children to look for various, small items
 around the house, then place the item/s
 into the area corresponding to the letter
 it begins with. Encourage your child to
 hear the initial sound independently.



Weekly Phonics Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Sing Nursery Rhymes and songs together. Add in actions and change the words. Can children think of different rhyming words to add in? Repeat old favourites and learn new rhymes. You can find an A-Z of Nursery Rhymes here.
- Daily phonics Practice the sounds your child is working on and blend words.
 This can be oral blending (e.g. spoken out loud c-a-t) or written if appropriate.
 Interactive games (use the free phonics play, or use the log in provided on the useful websites sheet).
- Sing the song, 'Incy, Wincy Spider' and add in the rain sounds using your rainmaker (from the learning project below).

Weekly Writing Tasks (Aim to do 1 per day)

- Practice forming the letters of the alphabet. Follow your school's script which you can find here.
- Take your child for a litter pick around your front and back garden. Create a poster to remind people to put rubbish in the bin.
- Write your secret name Support your child to write their name using a white crayon. Then ask them to paint over it with watercolour paints and watch their amazement when they discover secret marks coming up out of nowhere...



The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about the environment. Learning may focus on changes to different environments, the impact of humans on environments, climate change etc.

- Create a daily weather chart- Record using pictures. How has the weather changed over the week?
- Windy Vs Calm Combine a water play activity with soapy water and a wash day. Hang out washing on a windy day. Compare drying times on a dry calm day, a very hot sunny day or even a cloudy, showery day.
- **Make Kites** -. Support your child to make a kite using the instructions <u>here</u>. You could also decorate your paper with pictures before assembling your kite.

• Recycling/ Exploring Materials-

• Provide your child with a selection of packaging to sort into groups to recycle. Can they identify plastic, paper, card, metal.

Weather sounds (Rainmakers)

 Provide your child with either a plastic container, bottle or other junk modelling item. Pour in a spoon or two of rice or lentils and secure with a bottle lid or sellotape. Decorate with stickers, glitter and sequins if you have them available. Have fun exploring making rain sounds.

Ice-

- Watch 'Frozen- In Summer'. Discuss with your child what they think will happen to Olaf when it gets warm. Support your child to fill up ice cube trays or plastic containers, if ice cube trays are not available, and freeze. Once frozen, take them out and explore how quickly they melt: in your hands, in the fridge, on the windowsill and when blown with the hairdryer.
- Search on Google Maps for the UK. Discuss with your child the colour of the land and sea. Scroll up to look at the Arctic. Discuss why the land looks different in the Arctic, because the land is covered in snow and ice. Discuss the differences in temperature in the UK and the Arctic. Look at a picture of an igloo on google.

Fill an ice cube tray with water and when frozen take out and support your child to create their own igloo out of the ice cubes.


